

Disqualifying Criminal Offenses Nursing Program

Any conviction, plea of guilty or no contest, or deferred adjudication of the following criminal offenses (Felony or Misdemeanor) appearing on a criminal background check within 7 years will disqualify an applicant for admission to CCU Nursing Program.

- I. Crimes of violence (assault, sexual offenses, arson, kidnapping, murder, any crime against an at-risk adult or juvenile, etc.) as defined in section 18-1.3-406 C.R.S.
- II. Any offense involving unlawful sexual behavior, as defined in section 18-1.3-406 C.R.S.
- III. Any crime, the underlying basis of which has been found by the court on the record to include an act of domestic violence, as defined in section 18-6-800.3 C.R.S.
- IV. Any crime of child abuse, as defined in section 18-6-401 C.R.S.
- V. Any crime related to the sale, possession, distribution or transfer of narcotics or controlled substances including, but not limited to, marijuana, as defined in section 18-18 C.R.S.
- VI. Crimes of theft, as defined in section 18-4-401 C.R.S.
- VII. Any offense of sexual assault on a client by a psychotherapist, as defined in section 18-3-405.5 C.R.S.
- VIII. Crimes of moral turpitude (prostitution, public lewdness/exposure, etc.), as defined in 18-7 C.R.S.
- IX. Registered sex offenders, as defined in 16-22-103 C.R.S.
- X. Any offense in another state, the elements of which are substantially similar to the elements of any of the above offenses.
- XI. One DUI or one DWAI in the last 7 years, as defined in 42-4-1301 C.R.S.
- XII. Any felony crimes.
- XIII. OIG/GSA (office of inspector General Sanction Report/General Services Administration) List- Exclusion list of offenses against Medicaid/Medicare. (This list shows offenses trying to defraud the Government when receiving payment as welfare, Medicare checks and default of student health care loans.)

Students who have successfully completed the terms of their deferred adjudication agreement will not be disqualified.
